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Toronto is a city full of opportunity – but it's also a city marked by a growing divide. One in five people in Toronto lives below the poverty line, and soaring costs of living are putting a deep strain on vulnerable families. Poverty and unemployment rates for newcomers are among the highest in the overall population.

At New Circles, we provide families in need with free clothing so they can stay warm and healthy even with limited income. But that's only the start. To build a successful future, we need to take an integrated approach.

We believe that clothing offers a natural gateway to social and economic empowerment. It protects us from the elements, and preserves our dignity. It keeps us warm, and conveys who we are. It is about health, culture, selfexpression, and inclusion. And it can be the starting point to develop skills, build confidence, and ultimately find a job.

This year, we provided a record 15,000 people with quality, free clothing through GLOW, added a fifth neighbourhood to our catchment area, and extended our services to government-assisted refugees across the city. Our employment programs provided training for 92 youth and adults, and we continued to enrich the curriculum by fully incorporating soft skills training, and providing more opportunities for professional networking. As a result, 74 percent of our adult participants were employed or enrolled in further training within six months of graduating.

Our dedicated donors, volunteers, staff, and board members each contribute their own skills, strengths, and resources to this work. We were pleased to take on new leadership roles as Chair of the Board and Executive Director respectively this year, and look forward to continuing the growth of the past several years, while leading New Circles' evolution. Together, we're building a city that is collectively stronger and more diverse, where families can not only meet their needs, but also live successful and empowered lives.

It all starts with **GLOW**, a unique gateway to a variety of services supporting social and economic integration.


20,000 visits to **GLOW**

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At GLOW, a diverse range of people can get the clothing they need for work, school, and daily life, find out about other community supports, and gain hands-on work experience in a retail-like space.

An individual can save up to \$1,250 a year on clothing by using GLOW – critical support when you're facing the choice between a warm meal and a warm coat. In 2017-18, a record 15,000 people visited GLOW for free, quality clothing.That's over \$18.75 million saved.

In February, we opened our services to residents of Oakridge, and celebrated with a successful launch at Warden Woods Community Centre. Through partnerships with other service providers, including COSTI Immigrant Services and Mount Sinai Hospital's Schwartz/Reisman Emergency Centre, we were able to provide clothing to those in critical need, such as government-assisted refugees and people experiencing health emergencies.

Our programs focus on retail, customer service, and office administration as ideal launching pads for newcomer women to rebuild their careers or land their first jobs in Canada.

This year, we continued to enrich our curriculum to ensure participants graduate with the skills employers are looking for. In Retail and Customer Service Foundations, we fully incorporated the Employability Skills Assessment Tool (a collaborative framework for mentoring participants on soft skills like motivation, confidence, and time management), and in Business Office Skills, we strengthened the program's digital literacy component with additional online learning tools.

We also created more opportunities to connect with employers through networking events with the State Street Professional Women's Network, TELUS, Mackenzie Investments, Home Depot, and OMD Canada. Along with focused job search support from Neighbourhood Link Support Services, employment outcomes keep getting better. Beginning in 2017, we also began tapping into our graduate pool to hire qualified candidates for staff positions in GLOW.

With all that, I could do what I wanted to do: work in an office environment, and use my skills to give back. I'm now proud to be working at New Circles and helping people every day.

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From our clients to our volunteers, women form the core of our community.



Our women clients are mothers, sisters, professionals, caregivers, leaders, and much more. They are the primary family members who take care of their families' clothing needs. Most of them are newcomers to Canada, and they face unique challenges finding employment and integrating socially.

This year, our social programs provided support tailored for women in group and one-on-one settings. The Friendship Circle offered a safe space for 40 women to form positive relationships and improve their conversational English, through activities like language lessons, a cultural potluck, and community excursions. Peer Mentors provided personalized tutoring that helped women work towards specific goals, like studying for the citizenship exam, or earning their driver's licenses.

Next year, we're looking forward to developing programs that prepare women to enroll in our training programs, by building their confidence, learning practical skills, and improving their workplace English.



From the beginning, New Circles has been driven by passionate volunteers.



It started nearly fifteen years ago, when our founder Cindy Blakely collected basic necessities from friends, family, and colleagues, and distributed these donations to people in need.

In 2017–18, more than 250 individual volunteers and 45 corporate, school, and community groups provided their time, energy, and skills to helping us achieve our mission. Their work spanned across the agency – sorting clothing, assisting clients, doing outreach in the community, helping at the front desk, making phone calls, translating and interpreting, and so much more.




